



### Connections of Mission Inn

Steve Spiller, Mission Inn Museum January 23, 7pm Assembly Room, A.K. Smiley Public Library

The Mission Inn is the City of Riverside's Cultural Landmark Number 1, a State Historic Landmark, listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and one of only four hotels in California designated as a National Historic Landmark. Master of the Inn Frank Miller's romantic version of California's 18th and 19th century bundled into this square block site has fascinated decades of visitors. Despite the "glass wall" that has separated Riverside County from San Bernardino and Redlands from Riverside, the Mission Inn has seemingly escaped this historic partition. Since 1902 the Mission Inn has served and continues to serve our region as an important site of events - weddings,

# Old House Group Meeting

Wednesday, January 18, 7:00 PM 1239 Mira Monte Drive

The January, 2006 OLD HOUSE GROUP Meeting will be held Wednesday, January 18 at 7:00 pm. Dr. Stan and Jan Korfmacher will be hosting the meeting in their outstanding 50-year-old home located at 1239 Mira Monte Drive in Redlands.

Jan and Stan's home is a striking example of the Mid-Century-Modern design concept developed under the influence of Richard Neutra (who studied with Frank Lloyd Wright). This home was designed by noted Redlands architect Claire Henry Day and was built in 1955 for Dr. Porter.

The Korfmachers acquired their classic home in 1964. With its flat roofs, open floor plan, large fireplace, corner glass windows, vast glass walls (but not on the west side) and expanses of overhangs, their home was designed to be open at night and closed during the day - to efficiently use the weather patterns here in Redlands. *Continued*, page 2

The house is about 100 feet in length and almost 80% of the north side of the home is glass. Three expansive patios add to the indoor/outdoor feeling of this contemporary home.

Jan and Stan have maintained the original style of their home for almost 42 years. They have the original floors and, although they found their home to be very energy efficient, they did incorporate central air conditioning. Also they gradually replaced some of the louvered windows and they added a carport and a covered spa - both in the Mid-Century-Modern style.

At one time, the Korfmachers traded in antiques and their home is now a treasure trove of outstanding vintage and family collections. More than 22 unique collections of clocks, glassware, vases, crystals and more are showcased in their home - and they generously share their collections with the

Public in displays at both the Redlands Historic Glass Museum and at the Edward Dean Museum.

Jan and Stan feel this classic home is now truly 'THEIR' home. They found their home even had an influence on their children. Their youngest son is a "Historic Preservation" architect in Texas where architect Leon Armantrout says "He is doing good work". Jan and Stan look forward to sharing their unique home and collections with the Old House Group.


