


The Great Flood of 1938

Suzie Earp, CSUSB September 25th, 7:00pm Assembly Room, A.K. Smiley Public Library

Our program September 25th will be a disaster. That's right, we begin the new fall season with Suzie Earp, Historian Archivist for the Water Resources Institute at California State University, San Bernardino. Last March Susan Keith and Tom Atchley viewed her powerpoint program at the San Bernardino County Museum on the "Great Flood of 1938." This disaster was the greatest flood in San Bernardino County and the San Bernardino Valley in the 20th century.

Suzie Earp earned a B.A. in history and is completing an M.A. in Interdisciplinary Studies at California State University, San Bernardino. Her program begins with slide photos of 1930s just before the

flood. She previews the flood with dialog, which sets the scene for what happened in March 1938. With aerial views sprinkled throughout the program, viewers can't get lost with the slide locations.

Destruction of Colton and the Southern Pacific yard is especially telling with spans of a dangling railroad line above newly-cut Santa Ana River bed. The Orange Show and the area just north of the Orange Show took a direct hit from Warm Creek and the Santa Ana combined.

Earp has more than 150 pictures of the flood itself along with an extraordinary 1938 home movie! She will show before and after shots of specific locations that were impacted by the flood, including Mill and "E" Streets in San Bernardino.

The historical society wishes to tape the personal reminiscences of those who were in Redlands or the surrounding area during the flood for the Heritage Room. We know extensive damage occurred in Mill Creek Canyon, the mouth of the Santa Ana River water system, the bridges across the wash to Highland, San Timoteo Canyon, Loma Linda, and Highland.

If you are in the possession of photographs, bring them and we will scan them before the meeting begins or at the end of the meeting. If we get them scanned early, we might be able to enjoy them while feasting on the evening treat.

NEW REDLANDS ORNAMENT


