

Loma Linda, Bryn Mawr, and the Redlands Connection

Jim Shipp, Loma Linda Historical Commission Monday, January 22, 7:00pm Assembly Room, A.K. Smiley Public Library

We begin the new year with Jim Shipp speaking to us about Loma Linda, Bryn Mawr, and the Redlands connection. Jim Shipp is a former Seventh-Day Adventist minister, who now teaches third grade at Bryn Mawr Elementary School. The California elementary curriculum guide requires third grade teachers to teach about their community and its history. Jim began by developing a website about the history of Loma Linda in 1999. His quest for information to captivate his students about local history is still located at http://rims.kl2.ca.us/foot_prints/index.html. Jim furthered his historical interests by becoming a member of the Loma Linda Historical Commission in 2000. He became the chairman of the commission in 2002.

Jim has a strong interest in preserving the historic places of Loma Linda, and is intent to preserve the Frink Adobe, the Curtis-Fisk House, the Cole House, the remains of the Zanja in the historical Mission Overlay District. Jim is currently president of the Loma Linda Area Parks and Historical Society, which maintains a website at www.lomalindahistory.org. He has expressed an interest to pursue a closer relationship with the Redlands Area Historical Society in mutual interests.

The OLD HOUSE GROUP will start the new year with their January Meeting on Wednesday, January 17 at 7:00 pm. Laura Vroman will be graciously hosting the meeting in her "HERITAGE AWARD" Winning home located at 624 Alvarado Street.

Dr. J. V. A. Love had this classic two story Craftsman-style house built in 1909 and it was referred to as the "Love" home. Laura's family hails from Rhode Island and they came to California in 1932 for a visit. Her Dad found the winters here in Redlands to be like the summers in Rhode Island so, after the family went back to Rhode Island, they returned to Redlands to look for a home with mild winters and to be close to Laura who had enrolled in the University of Redlands. They looked all around town and after considering homes on Sunset (a bit too far from the center of town), they found three houses on Alvarado Street they liked. They selected this home in 1933.

Laura's family has owned their house since 1933. They are the second owners of this family home. The original fireplace and woodwork highlight the hardwood floors that flow throughout most of the lower level. Carpet provides quiet and warmth in the bedrooms on the second floor. The home had six

Laura, a world traveler, says she didn't fully understand her Dad's feelings about cold winters until she returned from a recent visit to Rhode Island. "The winters there have certainly grown colder since I left."



Walking Tour of Palm Avenue Saturday January 13th at 9:00 a.m.

The Redlands Area Historical Society is sponsoring a historical walking tour of Palm Avenue Saturday January 13th beginning at 9:00 a.m. from the Charles Kendall Adams home (Plymouth Village) at 120 East Palm. The tour leader is Tom Atchley, vice president of the historical society. The tour cost is a \$10.00 donation to the RAHS preservation fund. No reservations are required and Judith Hunt, President of the Historical Society, will collect the donations.

The walking tour will travel west on Palm Avenue and end at West Palm and San Mateo. Parking another vehicle on West Palm near San Mateo is suggested for those that do not want to walk back on Palm at the end of the tour. Atchley will discuss the architecture of the homes as well as the people that lived on the street from the 1880s to 1920s.

Palm Avenue has many Heritage Home Awards from the historical society. The historical society began recognizing homes and businesses in 1975. Charles Kendall Adams 120 E. Palm, Edward P. Tuck 24 W. Palm, Clinton G. Gaylord 159 W. Palm, Oscar W. Harris 206 W. Palm, Thomas Jeffery 405 W. Palm, Francis Hunt Billings 417 W. Palm, Norman Barker 519 W. Palm, Marie L. Hegardt 635 W. Palm, Russell J. Waters 709 W. Palm, William Brooks 850 W. Palm, John W. Wilson 860 W. Palm, Helen Squires 1015 W. Palm, and Cornelia A. Hill 1113 W. Palm are all Heritage Home Award winners.

Palm Avenue offers a variety of architectural styles from Victorian, Italianate, Greek Revival, Craftsman, Eastman Stick, Classic Box, California Bungalow, and California Ranch. Many homes were considered mansions with domestic help, cooks, teamsters, and laborers all finding shelter. Many orange growers, downtown businessmen, teachers, carpenters, wealthy manufacturers, doctors, water entrepreneurs, and land developers have lived there.

The tour should take about two hours and end close to 11:00 a.m. at Palm and San Mateo. Good walking shoes and a light coat for the brisk January morning are recommended.
