

A Letter from your President...

At our Annual Heritage Awards and Ice Cream Social I will conclude my first year as your President. As I look back on this past year your Board of Directors has made many accomplishments on behalf of the Society. Your Board has worked harder than ever to bring you interesting monthly programs, we partnered with the Redlands Conservancy to plan the first ever Historic Preservation Week and presented to you a diverse group of historic homes to tour with the Old House Group. We partnered again with the Redlands Conservancy to hold what I believe will be the model for an annual workshop on historic preservation with the Redlands City Council and the appointed Commissioners of the Planning and Historic and Scenic Preservation Commissions. The results of the workshop are already producing new civic policies that will help preserve our historic resources.

This last year we planned a full schedule of historic tours that were led by our past president, Tom Atchley. The tours included a two-part tour of Center Street, tour of Hillside Cemetery, State Street and a two-part tour of Cajon Street. The tours each year serve as the main fundraiser for the Society. Lady of Victory Our Missionary Sisters led by sister Millie Peaslee was in charge of Burrage Mansion in the 1960's. Notes from visit: Sister Millie came to Burrage as Mother Superior 1961-62. She was in charge of 18 to 23 sisters living in the mansion. Sister Millie first came to mansion in 1952 as a summer retreat and swept the front steps. Oranges were picked and sent to Foothill Packing House each year. Sister Sharon came to the mansion very young and along with Olivia and Elizabeth maintained the grounds. Sisters lived simply in the home. They worked with the poor of Redlands and carried out missionary work. Victory Noll Sisters are a teaching order. They also held Brownie and Girl Scout retreats. As many as 90 sisters might attend a summer retreat and sleep many to a room upstairs. Sisters riding a tractor through the grove was a common sight. Selling oranges to the public was encouraged. visiting were treated to a lunch in what was once their chapel. Tom Atchley was invited to attend and spoke briefly on how Redlanders appreciated the sisters while they

Mural Project for Redlands High School

The Class of 2012 had some thought-provoking discussions just a month prior to graduation at the Redlands Bowl. They wanted to leave the school campus something that the alumni would embrace and that would last for generations as well. They adopted a Mural Project idea that will use the western white wall of Terrier Gym. They have arranged for a mural artist alum through the efforts of retired art instructor John Fisher. Plans are well underway for a depiction of the 1903 building along with Clock Auditorium from an original color post card of the campus. Students have met several times with Economics and Government instructor, Rose Sanders.

This project needs a fundraiser to pay for the paint, scaffolding rental, artist the other items necessary to get the job done. The mural will be clearly seen from the campus south parking lot. Terrier Gym offers a huge canvas for this mural. Christina Rivera, principal of Redlands High School, is on board with administrative support. When I chaired the Redlands High Centennial in 1991, alumni all thought of Redlands High and the original building torn down in 1956. Today, the most requested photograph for student clubs on campus are lining up on the steps of 1928 Clock Auditorium. At a recent meeting with the principal, Rose Sanders and her energetic husband offered to arrange for a big fundraiser over the course of a week. The theme is National Day of the Cowboy.

West Kighland Avenue Evening Shadow Tours

Redlands Area Historical

Society is announcing two tours of West Highland Avenue on June 16 and June 23 from 6:00-7:30 p.m. The walking tours will be led by Tom Atchley and cost \$10 per person. The descending summer sun and daylight saving time allows for a cooler evening walk as shadows and shade cross the earthen pathway and sidewalks.

The first tour on June 16th will begin at the corner of West Highland and Cajon Street and proceed west to Center Street. The second walking tour begins at West Highland and Center Street and will end at Highland/Cedar Point. Well-mannered leashed dogs are welcome.

West Highland Avenue is a popular street dubbed the "Butler Belt" in the early days of Redlands because of the large Victorian homes built there. Actually only a few of the homes employed butlers but maids were found in nearly all the homes. Judson and Brown subdivided the Residence Tract in 1886 and advertised lots at one-third down, one-third more when the domestic water arrives and one-third when the Redlands trolley system was inaugurated.

Bankers, packing house managers, health inspectors, oil magnates, land developers, newspaper publisher, both of Redlands' founders, an ambassador are just some of the career folks attracted to the street. The oldest home was built in 1887 just after the Redlands Domestic Water Company announced service to the tract. Building of Victorian, Craftsman, California Bungalow, Classic Box and other styles followed in a flurry of construction to 1900. Some of the leading architects of Redlands proudly displayed their designs in a variety of styles. Many of the homes are placed on three lots instead of one. Homes predated the sewer system, electricity and early automobiles but quickly adapted as the improvements became common.

Nearby Prospect Park owned by the England family, Kimberly Crest, the Fisher Mansion and well-manicured grounds gave the neighborhood distinction that carries on to the present.
