Redlands Men Participate in World War I



Ann Cordy Deegan will present her research on Redlanders participation in World War I at the Redlands Area Historical Society meeting Monday, February 23, in the Assembly Room of A.K. Smiley Public Library at 7:00 p.m. Deegan researched thoroughly the men that fought in the Great War and followed them using the *Redlands Daily Facts*, military records, cemetery archives, National Archives and numerous sources to construct her presentation.

Deegan co-authored "Images of America: Early Redlands" last year with new Smiley Library archivist, Maria Carrillo, which featured profiles on some thirty photographers of early Redlands. This book is available at Smiley Library.

Deegan received her Ph.D. from the University of Maryland and her M.S. and B.S. degrees from the University of California,



Union Ice Company in Crafton

Mentone was quick to boast

I he Redlands Electric Light and Power Company led by Henry H. Sinclair, Henry Fisher and George H. Crafts made history in 1892 with the announcement of a power plant on Mill Creek to produce hydroelectric power using a three-phase system. Their first big contract customer was the Union Ice Company. In December 1892. of the power company signed contract with Union Ice to provide 150 horsepower for a twenty-five year period with an option for 250 horse power after one year. This was the largest contract by a

Union Ice had a facility in Redlands and as late as May 1892 shipped 42 tons of ice to Redlands from Truckee. The ice was used to California. preserve railroad shipments of fresh fruit such as apricots, peaches, plums, Several Redlands grapes. canneries used vast amounts of ice from early spring until late fall each vear. Redlands men cut ice on Big Bear Lake in the winter and stored it in caves and shaded canyons under sawdust and tarps. The long trek down the mountain on the backs of burros cut into the ice blocks. Vast quantities were needed so most ice was used to make ice-cream treats.

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
repairs completed the press was invited for a tour. Craig viewed exceptionally clear ice and 1600 pounds ready to ship to San Bernardino. He remarked, "coming from inside cold storage was like going from Maine in winter to Redlands in an instant."

The success of Union Ice Company in Crafton prompted the Redlands Electric Light and Power Company to stretch power poles to Redlands and San Bernardino. The founders of the Redlands Company quickly laid plans for the Southern California Power Company and built three power houses on the Santa Ana River by the late 1890's. Just after the turn of the century two new power plants were added to the mouth of Mill Creek Canyon.

The paneled wagons from Union Ice soon delivered ice for ice boxes in Redlands kitchens. One of the last delivery locations was the James Eden home on East Citrus and Walnut in Crafton. Mrs. James Eden didn't get an electric refrigerator until the 1960s. ∞

Eureka Street Walking Tour

Redlands Area Historical Society has two walking tours planned for the next two months that will tour Eureka Street. Part One of the Eureka Street Tour will begin at 9:00 a.m. Saturday February 21 at the corner of Eureka and West Palm. This first tour of Eureka will travel north to Fern Avenue and then return to West Palm.

The homes on part one were built in the 1950s in the 700 block and 1920s in the 600 block. The 700 block defines the 1950s with car ports, cul-de-sacs, and the California Ranch style. No one contractor completed this subdivision.

The 600 block captures the Dike and Logie Subdivision with monumental street pillars, revival architecture, a few California bungalows and a street tree theme of incense cedars.

The 500 block of Eureka has a designated historic district with the Garrett Huizing California bungalow homes. Cobblestone porch piers, rock garden features, open verandas, low roof lines, protruding rafters and ribbon driveways for the new auto machines adorn this unique neighborhood.

The 400 block presents turn of the century homes that have both some modern features and carry-over designs from the Victorian Era.

The tour fee is \$10 and will be led by Tom Atchley, vice-president of the Redlands Area Historical Society and assisted by Bill Blankenship, president. Part Two of the Eureka Street Walking Tour begins March 7 at 9:00 a.m. on the corner of Fern and Eureka Street.

Society membership forms are available at the end of the tour along with historical society publications.


Redlands Area Historical Society programs are free and open to the public. Programs are provided to educate the public on the history of the area. Membership information is available at each meeting.

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
